# **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the Board approves Resolution 22-02, allowing the continued use of teleconferencing/videoconferencing to hold public meetings for Virtual RVPA Board Meetings in Compliance with AB 361 during the continuing state of emergency proclaimed by Governor Newsom on March 4, 2020.

### **DISCUSSION:**

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom declared a state of emergency under Government Code section 8625 due to COVID-19. Recognizing the need to promote social distancing while allowing local legislative bodies to continue operating during the emergency, Governor Newsom signed Executive Orders N-25-20, N-29-20, and N-08-21, which suspended provisions of the Brown Act. Those Orders permitted legislative bodies to hold virtual meetings; however, the relevant provisions expired on September 30, 2021.

On September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which extends the authority of public agencies to conduct meetings by teleconference, including video conferences, during State-declared emergencies. Specifically, the bill provides that a legislative body may hold virtual meetings in a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing. (Cal. Gov. Code § 54953(e)(1)(A)).

On September 22, 2021, the Marin County Director of Health & Human Services, Benita McLarin, sent a letter to the Marin County Board of Supervisors recommending continued social distancing for local government meetings.

Local government meetings are indoor meetings that are sometimes crowded, involve many different and unfamiliar households, and can last many hours. Given those circumstances, I recommend a continued emphasis on social distancing measures as much as possible to make public meetings as safe as possible. These measures can include video/teleconferencing when it meets community needs and spacing at in-person meetings so that individuals from different households are not sitting next to each other.

RVPA Board of Directors would like to adopt resolution 22-02 with the requisite findings that the (1) state of emergency is in effect, (2) that local officials are still recommending measures to promote social distancing, and (3) that the state of emergency directly impacts the ability of the public and the members of the RVFD Board of Directors to meet safely indoors in person

AB 361 requires the RVPA Board of Directors to make these findings at least every thirty days if it desires to continue meeting virtually. (Cal. Gov. Code § 54953(e)(3)). Therefore, staff has returned with resolution 22-02 for the Board's consideration, including the findings noted above.

The Ross Valley Paramedic Authority is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in the RVPA Board of Directors meetings while ensuring a safe and healthy environment.

### THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS ROSS VALLEY PARAMEDIC AUTHORITY

**WHEREAS,** the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed pursuant to his authority under the California Emergency Services Act, California Government Code Section 8625, that a state of emergency exists due to a novel coronavirus (COVID- 19); and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2021, in lifting many restrictions that the State previously imposed due to COVID-19, the Governor indicated that those changes did not end the ongoing, proclaimed State of emergency; and

WHEREAS, as of the date of this resolution, neither the Governor nor the Legislature have exercised their respective powers pursuant to California Government Code section 8629 to lift the State of emergency either by proclamation or by concurrent resolution in the state Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the continued local rates of transmission of the virus and variants causing COVID-19 are such that on September 22, 2021, the Marin County Director of Health & Human Services recommended that local government entities continue to emphasize social distancing to minimize the potential spread of COVID-19 during indoor, public meetings; and

WHEREAS, in light of this recommendation, the RVPA Board of Directors desires to continue to have the flexibility to meet by teleconference and/or videoconference;

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE ROSS VALLEY PARAMEDIC AUTHORITY BOARD OF DIRECTORS DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS

- 1. There is an ongoing proclaimed state of emergency relating to the novel coronavirus causing the disease known as COVID-19.
- 2. The State of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the RVFD Board of Directors to meet safely in person.
- 3. Local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing.

# **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the General Fund of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority (Authority), as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and respective budgetary comparison for the General Fund and the related notes to the financial statements and , which collectively comprise Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

# Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Authority's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

# Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

# Required Supplementary Information

Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

# Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Authority's basic financial statements. The statistical information are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The statistical information have not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on them.

### **MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS**

The Authority is issuing its financial statements in the format prescribed by the provisions of Government Accounting Standards Board Statement 34 (GASB 34), which requires the Authority to provide this overview of its financial activities for the fiscal year.

Please read this overview in conjunction with your reading of the accompanying Basic Financial Statements.

### THE PURPOSE OF THE AUTHORITY

The Authority is a joint-powers authority of seven municipal entities in Marin County, California that provides paramedic services to its members' citizens. The Authority's operations are financed by a special tax on residential and commercial property and transport billings.

#### FISCAL 2020-2021 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Financial highlights of the year ended June 30, 2021 include the following:

*Authority-wide:* 

- The Authority's total net position was \$2,188,620.
- Cash and investments of \$1,983,984 and \$353,562 in capital assets.
- Total Authority revenues include \$1,010,716 in charges for services and \$1,844,748 in special taxes.
- The Authority Board of Directors voted to increase the special assessment for FY 2020/21 to \$87.00 per unit to maintain pace with expenses and insure a proper reserve balance.

#### Fund Basis:

- General Fund assets totaled \$2,027,767 of which \$1,983,984 was cash and investments.
- General Fund revenues were \$2,857,991. Property Tax and transportation revenues stayed on budget.
- General Fund expenditures of \$2,511,234 included \$1,683,338 in Marin County contract services, and engine company paramedic programs for Larkspur of \$175,433 and \$242,348 for Ross Valley Fire Department for a total of \$417,781.
- The increase in the fund balance of the General Fund was \$346,757.

### The Basic Financial Statements

With the implementation of GASB 34, the Authority now issues Authority-wide and individual Fund financial statements, called Basic Financial Statements. Since the Authority has only one fund, the difference between these two statements is limited to the recording of the Authority's capital assets in the Authority-wide statements only.

The Authority-wide Financial Statements provide a longer-term view of the Agency's activities as a whole and comprise the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities. The Statement of Net Position provides information about the financial position of the Authority as a whole, including all its capitals assets and long-term liabilities on the full accrual basis, similar to that used by corporations. The Statement of Activities provides information about all the Authority's revenues and all its expenses, also on the full accrual basis, with the emphasis on measuring net revenues or expenses of each of the Agency's programs.

The Fund Financial Statements report the Authority's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements and focus primarily on the short-term activities of the Authority's General Fund and other Major Funds. The Fund Financial Statements measure only current revenues and expenditures and fund balances; they exclude capital assets, long-term debt and other long-term amounts.

The increase in current and other assets is mainly attributed to a combination of an increase in property tax revenue and a decrease in expenditures.

For fiscal year 2021, the account receivable is June's property tax accrual.

The decrease in net investment in capital assets is related to depreciation expense.

For fiscal year 2021, Charges for services includes Transportation billing and Medicare payments. These revenues decreased by 6% from prior year, mainly due to COVID. Prior year 2020, Other revenue included GEMT payments. Even though revenues decreased they exceeded expenses by \$292,503 and ended the year with a net position of \$2,188,620.

### CAPITAL ASSETS

Under GASB 34, the Authority is required to record all its capital assets at their historical cost, and to depreciate these assets over their estimated useful lives. During fiscal year 2019, the Agency purchased an ambulance costing \$280,416. Total capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation as of June 30, 2021 is \$353,562. Further detail on capital assets may be found in Note 3 to the financial statements.

### CONTACTING THE AUTHORITY'S FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

# STATEMENT OF NET POSITION AND STATEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities is to summarize the entire Authority's financial activities and financial position. They are prepared on the same basis as is used by most businesses, which means they include all the Authority's assets and deferred outflows of resources and all its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources, as well as all its revenues and expenses. This is known as the full accrual basis-the effect of all the Authority's transactions is taken into account, regardless of whether or when cash changes hands, but all material internal transactions between Authority funds have been eliminated.

The Statement of Net Position summarizes the financial position of all the Authority's financial position in a single column.

The Statement of Activities reports increases and decreases in the Authority's net position. It is also prepared on the full accrual basis, which means it includes all the Authority's revenues and all its expenses, regardless of when cash changes hands. This differs from the "modified accrual" basis used in the Fund financial statements, which reflect only current assets, current liabilities, deferred outflows/inflows of resources, available revenues and measurable expenditures.

The Statement of Activities presents the Authority's expenses first, listed by program. Program revenues-that is, revenues which are generated directly by these programs-are then deducted from program expenses to arrive at the net expense of each governmental program. The Authority's general revenues are then listed in the Governmental Activities, and the Change in Net Position is computed and reconciled with the Statement of Net Position.

These financial statements along with the fund financial statements and footnotes are called *Basic Financial Statements*.

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# NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### A. Reporting Entity

The Ross Valley Paramedic Authority (Authority) is a joint powers authority created in 1982 by the Town of Fairfax, Kentfield Fire Protection District, City of Larkspur, County of Marin, Town of Ross, Town of San Anselmo and Sleepy Hollow Fire Protection District. The purpose of the Authority is to provide paramedic services to the citizens of these entities. The Authority is controlled by a seven member board consisting of one member from each of the participating entities. None of the entities exercise specific control over the budgeting and financing of the Authority's activities. The County of Marin Fire Department by contract provides full-time County employees including supervision by County fire department officers to render the paramedic services. Administrative and accounting services are provided by the City of Larkspur.

The Authority's operations are financed by a parcel tax on each residential unit and an equivalent amounts for commercial property and transport billings. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, the tax rate was \$79 per unit, including a collection fee of \$0.50 levied by the County of Marin.

The accounting policies of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority conform with generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the significant policies:

B. Basis of Presentation

The Authority's Basic Financial Statements are prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Government Accounting Standards Board is the acknowledged standard setting body for establishing accounting and financial reporting standards followed by governmental entities in the United States of America.

These Statements require that the financial statements described below be presented.

*Government-wide Statements:* The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities include the financial activities of the overall Authority. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other nonexchange transactions.

The Statement of Activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each function of the Authority's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program or function and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include (a) charges paid by the recipients of goods or services offered by the programs, (b) grants and *contributions* that are restricted to meeting the operational needs of a particular program and (c) fees, grants and contributions that are restricted to financing the acquisition or construction of capital assets. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues.

*Fund Financial Statements:* The fund financial statements provide information about the Authority's fund. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major individual governmental fund displayed in acolumn.

### C. Major Fund

The Authority's **General Fund** is its only fund. It is used to account for all financial resources. General operating expenditures, fixed charges and capital costs are paid from this fund.

### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

### D. Basis of Accounting

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement focus* and the full *accrual basis* of accounting. Revenues are recorded when *earned* and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are *incurred*, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. Basis of accounting refers to *when* revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements, regardless of the measurement focus applied. All governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Thus, fund revenues are recognized when they become measurable *and* available as net current assets. Measurable means the amount of the transaction can be determined and available means the amount is collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter (generally sixty days) to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Amounts which could not be measured or were not available were not accrued as revenue in the current fiscal year.

Governmental funds are reported using the *current financial resources* measurement focus and the *modified accrual* basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when *measurable* and *available*. The Authority considers all revenues reported in the governmental funds to be available if the revenues are collected within sixty days after year-end. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. Governmental capital asset acquisitions are reported as *expenditures* in governmental funds. Proceeds of governmental long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as *other financing sources*.

Those revenues susceptible to accrual are contributions from member agencies, interest revenue and charges for services. Fines and forfeitures are not susceptible to accrual because they are not measurable until received in cash.

*Non-exchange transactions,* in which the Authority gives or receives value without directly receiving or giving equal value in exchange, include property taxes, grants, entitlements, and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied. Revenue from grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

### E. Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The Authority follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- a. Prior to the end of the fiscal year, a proposed operating budget is submitted to the Board of Directors for the fiscal year commencing the following July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them. The budget is legally enacted through passage of a resolution.
- b. Formal budgetary integration is employed as a management control device during the year. Budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.
- c. The budget is legally enacted through passage of a resolution before July 1.

### F. Expenditures in Excess of Appropriations

### G. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Authority categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value hierarchy categorizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three levels based on the extent to which inputs used in measuring fair value are observable in the market.

Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 inputs are inputs - other than quoted prices included within level 1 - that are observable for an asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for an asset or liability.

If the fair value of an asset or liability is measured using inputs from more than one level of the fair value hierarchy, the measurement is considered to be based on the lowest priority level input that is significant to the entire measurement.

### H. Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

# NOTE 2 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

As of June 30, 2021, the Authority held cash and investments in the City of Larkspur investment pool so that it can be invested at maximum yield, consistent with safety and liquidity, while individual funds can make expenditures at any time. The City's investment policy and the California Government Code permit investments in United States Treasury Obligations, United States Agency Securities, Bankers' Acceptances, Medium-Term Notes, Commercial Paper, Repurchase Agreements, Certificates of Deposit, the California Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF), Money Market Mutual Funds and the Investment Trust of California (CALTrust). Please see the City of Larkspur's basic financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2021, for more information.

### NOTE 2 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

### Fair Value Hierarchy

The Authority categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure fair value of the assets. Level 1 inputs are quoted prices in an active market for identical assets; Level 2 inputs are significant other observable inputs; and Level 3 inputs are significant unobservable inputs.

The investments in CalTrust, classified as Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy, are valued based on the fair value factor provided by CalTrust, which is calculated as the average cost to net asset value per share of the Fund. At June 30, 2021, the fair value approximated the Authority's cost. Fair value is defined as the quoted market value on the last trading day of the period.

Investments in LAIF are not subject to the fair value hierarchy.

# NOTE 3 - CAPITAL ASSETS

All capital assets are valued at historical cost or estimate historical cost if actual historical cost is not available. Contributed capital assets are valued at their estimated acquisition value on the date contributed.

The purpose of depreciation is to spread the cost of capital assets equitably among all users over the life of these assets. The amount charged to depreciation expense each year represents that year's pro rata share of the cost of capital assets.

Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method which means the cost of the asset is divided by its expected useful life in years and the result is charged to expense each year until the asset is fully depreciated. The Authority has assigned the useful life of 10 years with a capitalization threshold of \$5,000.

### NOTE 4 - NET POSITION AND FUND BALANCES

### A. Net Position

Net Position is the excess of all the Authority's assets and deferred outflows of resources over all its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources, regardless of fund. Net Position is divided into three captions. These captions apply only to Net Position, which is determined only at the Government- wide level, and are described below:

*Net Investment in Capital Assets* describes the portion of Net Position which is represented by the current net book value of the Authority's capital assets.

Unrestricted describes the portion of Net Position which is not restricted to use.

#### B. Fund Balance

Governmental fund balances represent the net current assets of each fund. Net current assets generally represent a fund's cash and receivables, less its liabilities.

The Authority classifies its fund balances based on spending constraints imposed on the use of resources. For programs with multiple funding sources, the Authority prioritizes and expends funds in the following order: Restricted, Committed, Assigned, and Unassigned. Each category in the following hierarchy is ranked according to the degree of spending constraint:

*Nonspendable* represents balances set aside to indicate items do not represent available, spendable resources even though they are a component of assets. Fund balances required to be maintained intact and assets not expected to be converted to cash, such as prepaids, are included. However, if proceeds realized from the sale or collection of nonspendable assets are restricted, committed or assigned, then Nonspendable amounts are required to be presented as a component of the applicable category. As of June 30, 2021 the Authority does not have any nonspendable fund balance.

*Restricted* fund balances have external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, laws, regulations, or enabling legislation which requires the resources to be used only for a specific purpose. As of June 30, 2021 the Authority does not have any restricted fund balance.

*Committed* fund balances have constraints imposed by formal action of the Board which may be altered only by formal action of the Board. Nonspendable amounts subject to Board commitments are included along with spendable resources. As of June 30, 2021, the Authority does not have any committed fund balance.

*Assigned* fund balances are amounts constrained by the Authority's intent to be used for a specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed. Intent is expressed by the Board or its designee and may be changed at the discretion of the Board or its designee. This category includes Nonspendables, when it is the Board's intent to use proceeds or collections for a specific purpose, and residual fund balances, if any, which have not been restricted or committed.

*Unassigned* fund balance represents residual amounts that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned. This includes the residual general fund balance and residual fund deficits, if any, of other governmental funds.

# NOTE 4 - NET POSITION AND FUND BALANCES (CONTINUED)

### C. Minimum Fund Balance and Reserve Policies

The Authority adopted a Fund Balance Reserve Policy with Resolution 01/16, which established a minimum fund balance policy as well as a vehicle/equipment replacement reserve as follows:

*Minimum Unassigned Fund Balance Reserve Level:* It is the goal of the Authority to maintain a General Fund Reserve of, at a minimum, 20% of the projected operating expenditures for each fiscal year. The reserve is intended to be used in the event of a financial shortfall and for the purpose of providing sufficient working capital. Should the General Fund Reserve fall below 20%, the Authority will implement measures to restore the reserve percentage to 20%. The amount of the General Fund Reserve was \$300,000 as of June 30, 2021 and is included with the unassigned fund balance of the Authority.

*Vehicle/Equipment Replacement Reserve:* The purpose of the reserve is to provide for the orderly and timely replacement of ambulances and emergency equipment. The assigned fund balance of the reserve at June 30, 2021 was \$150,000.

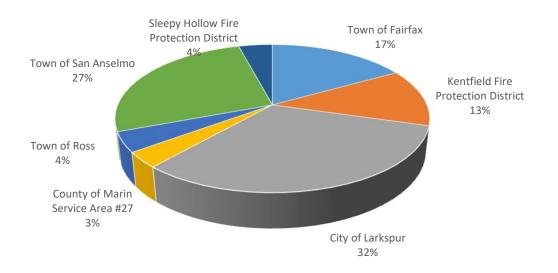

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities and general fund of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority (Authority) for the year ended June 30, 2021. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit.

### Our Responsibilities under U.S. Generally Accepted Auditing Standards

As stated in our engagement letter dated April 16, 2021, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to express opinions about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you or management of your responsibilities.

### Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; therefore, our audit involves judgment about the number of transactions to be examined and the areas to be tested.

Our audit included obtaining an understanding of the Authority and its environment, including internal control, sufficient to assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements and to design the nature, timing, and extent of further audit procedures. Material misstatements may result from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the entity or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the entity.

We performed the audit according to the timing previously communicated to you on the engagement letter.

### Significant Audit Findings

### *Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices*

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Authority are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the Authority changed accounting policies related to financial reporting by adopting the following Statements of Governmental Accounting Standards (GASB Statement) in 2021:

- SASB Statement No.93, Interbank offered rates (except LIBOR removal and lease modifications)

### > GASB Statement No. 98, The Annual Comprehensive Financial Report

We noted no transactions entered into by the Authority during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the Authority's financial statements were:

- Depreciable lives and estimated residual value of property and equipment
- Investments valuations
- Accumulated depreciation

Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. The most sensitive disclosure(s) affecting the financial statements were:

- Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
- Cash and Investments
- Capital Assets

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

### Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

### Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to each opinion unit's financial statements taken as a whole.

### Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

### Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letters dated January 14, 2022.

### Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

### Other Matters

We applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information (RSI) that supplements the basic financial statements. Our procedures consisted of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We did not audit the RSI and do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the RSI.

We were not engaged to report on statistical information, which accompany the financial statements but are not RSI. Such information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

### Restriction on Use

This information is intended solely for the use of Board of Directors and management of the Authority and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

- 21. Deposit and investment risks have been properly and fully disclosed.
- 22. Capital assets, including infrastructure assets, are properly capitalized, reported, and if applicable, depreciated.
- 23. All required supplementary information is measured and presented within the prescribed guidelines.
- 24. With regard to investments and other instruments reported at fair value:
  - a. The underlying assumptions are reasonable and they appropriately reflect management's intent and ability to carry out its stated courses of action.
  - b. The measurement methods and related assumptions used in determining fair value are appropriate in the circumstances and have been consistently applied.
  - c. The disclosures related to fair values are complete, adequate, and in accordance with U.S. GAAP.
  - d. There are no subsequent events that require adjustments to the fair value measurements and disclosures included in the financial statements.
- 25. With respect to providing assistance in preparation of the financial statements and related notes of the Authority, we have performed the following:
  - a. Made all management decisions and performed all management functions;

- c. Unrestricted access to persons within the entity from whom you determined it necessary to obtain audit evidence.
- d. All transactions have been recorded in the accounting records and are reflected in the financial statements.
- 27. We have disclosed to you the results of our assessment of the risk that the financial statements may be materially misstated as a result of fraud.

- 28. We have provided to you our analysis of the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, including significant conditions and events present, and if necessary, our analysis of management's plans, and our ability to achieve those plans.
- 29. We have no knowledge of any fraud or suspected fraud that affects the entity and involves:
  - a. Management;
  - b. Employees who have significant roles in internal control; or
  - c. Others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements.
- 30. We have no knowledge of any allegations of fraud, or suspected fraud, affecting the entity's financial statements communicated by employees, former employees, vendors, regulators, or others.
- 31. We are not aware of any pending or threatened litigation, claims, and assessments whose effects should be considered when preparing the financial statements.
- 32. We have disclosed to you the identity of the entity's related parties and all the related party relationships and transactions of which we are aware.
- 33. There have been no communications from regulatory agencies concerning noncompliance with or deficiencies in accounting, internal control, or financial reporting practices.
- 34. The Authority has no plans or intentions that may materially affect the carrying value or classification of assets and liabilities.
- 35. We have disclosed to you all guarantees, whether written or oral, under which the Authority is contingently liable.
- 36. We have disclosed to you all nonexchange financial guarantees, under which we are obligated and have declared liabilities and disclosed properly in accordance with GASB Statement No. 70, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Nonexchange Financial Guarantees,* for those guarantees where it is more likely than not that the entity will make a payment on any guarantee.
- 37. For nonexchange financial guarantees where we have declared liabilities, the amount of the liability recognized is the discounted present value of the best estimate of the future outflows expected to be incurred as a result of the guarantee. Where there was no best estimate but a range of estimated future outflows has been established, we have recognized the minimum amount within the range.
- 38. - 40. There are no:
  - a. Violations or possible violations of laws or regulations, or provisions of contracts or grant agreements whose effects should be considered for disclosure in the financial statements or as a basis for recording a loss contingency, including applicable budget laws and regulations.
  - b. Unasserted claims or assessments that our lawyer has advised are probable of assertion and must be disclosed in accordance with GASB-62.
  - c. Other liabilities or gain or loss contingencies that are required to be accrued or disclosed by GASB-62
  - d. Continuing disclosure consent decree agreements or filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission and we have filed updates on a timely basis in accordance with the agreements (Rule 240, 15c2-12).
- 41. The Authority has satisfactory title to all owned assets, and there are no liens or encumbrances on such assets nor has any asset or future revenue been pledged as collateral, except as disclosed to you.
- 42. We have complied with all aspects of grant agreements and other contractual agreements that would have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of noncompliance.
- 43. We have reviewed and approved the various adjusting journal entries that were proposed by you for recording in our books and records reflected in the financial statements.
- 44. We have provided to you our views on reported audit findings, conclusions, and recommendations, as well as planned corrective actions.
- 45. The Authority has satisfactory title to all owned assets (not right to use assets that are leased), and there are no liens or encumbrances on such capital assets; nor has the Authority pledged any capital assets as collateral.
- 46. Provisions for uncollectible receivables have been properly identified and recorded.
- 47. The methods and significant inputs and assumptions used to determine fair values of financial instruments are determined by the Authority's investment custodians. The methods and significant assumptions used result in a measure of fair value appropriate for financial statement measurement and disclosure purposes and are in accordance with the provisions of GASB Statement No. 72, *Fair Value Measurement and Application*.
- 48. The following information about financial instruments with off-balance sheet risk and financial instruments with concentrations of credit risk has been properly disclosed in the financial statements: (a) the extent, nature, and terms of financial instruments with off-balance-sheet risk, (b) the amount of credit risk of financial instruments with off-balance-sheet risk and information about the collateral supporting such financial instruments, and

(c) significant concentrations of credit risk from all financial instruments and information about the collateral supporting such financial instruments.

- 49. We believe that the actuarial assumptions and methods used to measure the pension and other postemployment benefit liabilities and costs for financial accounting purposes are appropriate in the circumstances.
- 50. With respect to the supplementary information on which an in-relation opinion is issued accompanying the financial statements:

d. There were no significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the RSI.
